ADVOCATING FOR THE HOMELESS

Transitions Celebrates the Value of Justice at the "People Who Care" Event, Oct. 2

Folks stopped at the traffic light by the Women's Hearth on 2nd Avenue downtown often wonder what happens to the homeless women at the program's door. Transitions answers that question, and others about the organization's five other programs, in a celebration of their work towards justice in the Spokane community. The 17th annual "People Who Care" event on October 2nd explores the realities of homelessness and opportunities for advocacy, the positive work that this organization does every day.

Rosemary Wear, Spokane attorney at Wear Law Office steps up as this year's Keynote Speaker. Rose knows the homeless and marginalized community well, serving as a volunteer for over 7 years at Transitions' Women's Hearth, offering free-of-charge legal assistance to women needing help navigating the Social Security Disability process. Rose was awarded the Peirone Prize, a local philanthropy award, in 2017. Like Transitions, Rose is a local treasure.

Rose, along with two alumnae from Transitions' programs, ask you to join them as they share the impact of this local organization, which moves lives forward by work focusing on four key values, one of which is justice.
