During 2016 Transitions achieved the following accomplishments:

- Served 1,613 women and their children
- Provided 511 employment referrals
- Assisted 115 women in finding permanent housing

Transitions Executive Director Edie Rice-Sauer shares “We truly work to end poverty and homelessness for women and children in Spokane, not just provide band-aids. At Transitions, perhaps all our work is really about helping women find their self-worth, finding respect for oneself. That self-respect makes goals achievable.”
